Thousands were dying each day and life seemed bleak for all of us. Today things are totally different as we emerge from the worse pandemic in over 100 years. I am proud to say that our parish did its part to be a sign of hope during this trying period.

For the last year we conducted online masses, outdoor masses, along with the celebration of sacraments in new, creative ways that protected us and encouraged us to move

forward. Thanks to your support and discipline, we are emerging more united and stronger than ever. Who do I thank for such a miraculous outcome? YOU! You did it with your support

and prayers along with your caring of community. These are the factors that are unbeatable in a crisis.

Today we are returning to a new normal. I thought I would give you an update on our progress. Here is a list of where we are:

1. We are now celebrating fully-opened masses at 4 p.m., 7:30 a.m., 9 a.m. and 11 p.m.

These are masses with no restrictions. Masks are optional at these masses.

- 2. We are celebrating one mass at 5:30 p.m. that is still a protocol mass. This mass is designed for those who wish to attend but feel that they are not ready for a crowded mass without mask requirements. This mass is also available for those who have not been vaccinated or for those who may have a medical reason cannot receive a vaccine. This is a safe haven for anyone.
- 3. We are starting to re-establish some of our cherished ministries. Already, Soup Patrol organizers are canvassing volunteers about the startup. Casa Maria outreach with lunches is starting to be organized.
- 4. We are now celebrating weddings and other celebrations indoors with the potential

of receptions.

- 5. Some of the physical repairs and replacements taking place are:
- a. Replacing our broken stove in the kitchen
- b. Painting and upgrade of our confessional
- c. Cleaning and sanitizing our church
- 6. We are now in the process of raising funds to replace our portable altar with a new beautiful permanent altar that reflects the richness of our community and region. Casa Alitas, Aid for **Migrant Families**

asa Alitas, also known as the Alitas Program of Catholic Community Services (CCS), is a humanitarian aid project committed to providing assistance to asylum-seekers released from ICE and Border Patrol detention into our community. Volunteers offer support by providing hospitality, including housing, food, clothing, toiletries, advocacy, and travel assistance. Our goal is to provide a welcoming, comfortable, safe and healthy location for the guests to await their journeys, and to prepare them to reunite with family across the country.

Our History

The program began in June 2014 as a response to hundreds of Central American travelers who were being dropped off by ICE and Border Patrol at the Greyhound Bus station here in Tucson. What began as a few people from local churches coming together to bring food to the bus station, became an entire formalized program and a large, welcoming shelter space. As of December 2019, Casa Alitas has served over 35,000 asylum-seekers.

Our Team

Casa Alitas is run by only a few staff and over 1500 volunteers. Our volunteers come from all over and from all different backgrounds. Some speak Spanish but many

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Beatification Ceremony Held for Salvatorian's Founder

'Venerable' Father Francis Jordan now is called 'Blessed'



he Basilica of St. John Lateran in Rome, Italy, was the site of the beatification of Salvatorian Founder, Venerable Father Francis Mary of the Cross Jordan. The ceremony took place

on May 15, 2021. A Mass of Thanksgiving was held the following day at St. Peter's Basilica. The USA Salvatorians celebrated with a Zoom Ceremony on Sunday, May 16.

Fr. Jordan's path to beatification began in 1942, when documentation of his life and works was sent to the Vatican for review. After Fr. Jordan was bestowed with the title "Servant of God," Salvatorians helped spread his reputation of holiness with more and more people around the world.

In 2011 Pope Benedict XVI officially announced that Fr. Jordan "lived a holy life," acknowledged the "heroicity of his virtues" and declared him "Venerable." The next steps – testimony and confirmation of a miracle –




The Miracle

In 2014, medical specialists informed a young couple in Brazil that their unborn child had an incurable bone disease, skeletal dysplasia. The couple, who were Lay Salvatorians, invited fellow Salvatorian Family members to pray with them through the intercession of Fr. Francis Jordan. On September 8, 2014 – Feast of the Birth of the Blessed Mother

and anniversary of Fr. Jordan's death – their daughter was born completely healthy. After verifying all canonical requirements, Pope Francis declared a miraculous healing worked by God through Fr. Jordan's intercession. This official decree was the final step on his path to beatification.

"His beatification will reaffirm for the universal Church that the pursuit of holiness and salvation is only possible when we overcome our differences and place our trust in the unconditional mercy and providence of God," says Father Jeff Wocken, SDS, who leads the USA Province of Salvatorian priests and brothers headquartered in Milwaukee.

Grateful for the generosity of our Salvatorian family members and parishes, Simon explains, "The Company was able to drill deeper. There is more water for everyone regardless of their tribe, faith, belief and nationality. The drilling company asked me to plant some corn, kale, cabbage and spinach since the water is more than anticipated.

The welding for the metal polls to stand the tanks and the solar panel are being done. By the end of the next week, the entire project will be done. The village is beyond words.



Although the hospitality offered was different, an effort was made to provide a safe environment for the men to relax and take a shower in an outside shower that had been erected in the yard. The washing machines were still available for laundry and

a Porta-Potty was also installed. The yard was open from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. A volunteer did triage by taking the men's temperatures and asking a few health questions and they were provided with a mask. The guys

were greeted with a hot breakfast and could relax under shade tents that were erected and social distances were encouraged.



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

Program Overview

• Most asylum-seekers are families: parents, children and pregnant women from Central America and Mexico. They have traveled here over several days or weeks, often spent



- ICE and Border Patrol bring families directly to the Casa Alitas Welcome Center.
- •Casa Alitas provides housing, food. clothing, toiletries, advocacy, and travel assistance.



• Asylum-seekers are individuals who are fleeing persecution and violence in their home countries and have come to the U.S. asking for refuge protection.

- Asylum-seekers are granted temporary parole and can legally stay in country to wait for their court date.
- Only about 35% of asylum-seekers will win their cases and receive asylum in the U.S. They will then have full legal status and be eligible for government benefits, as well as, after a time, a green card and citizenship.

How Can I Help?

- Volunteer: we are always in need of volunteers! Spanish is helpful but there is so much you can do without any Spanish at all: drive, cook, serve meals, receive volunteers, etc.
- Donate: food, clothing, shoes, and toiletries. Donations can be delivered to the Catholic Community Services office at 140 W. Speedway Blvd. Tucson, and boxes in entryway at Most Holy Trinity.

But time and experience has shown that stretching would also be at work. I learned how to help prepare parish YouTube Masses by lecturing at the tapings a week before each was broadcast for our community. I learned that Zoom, long distance phoning, and distanced visits with masks on my porch could serve as spiritual companionship in a pinch and for a time. Perhaps the most age-sensitive lesson for me was that I could teach a three-hour class for future deacons and lay ministers by Zoom more physically ~ pain-free sitting at my computer at home ~ than I could by trying to alternate standing and stool-sitting in person with the back and heart issues that limit me.

I was, admittedly, really upset at first that I could not be with people in person during the COVID crisis, but alternatives proved to be not only possible but effective.

Homebound Ministry During the Pandemic
